Keeping Advent

I typed that title, "Keeping Advent," and then I thought, "the truth is that Advent keeps us." One of the things that our adult Sunday School class is exploring during the month of December is how much of what we call and have come to think of as "Christmas" has little to do with the Christian story of Jesus's birth as it's related in two of the four gospels. As Dr. Bruce Forbes points out in the book we're using, Christmas: a Candid History, long before there was anything resembling Christians or Christianity, there was winter. And since most of human history took place in pre-industrial Agrarian economies, life followed the rhythms dictated by seasons of planting, growing, harvesting and waiting through the dark for the cycle to start all over again. It was only natural then for these human cultures to develop seasonal celebrations particularly on the heels of harvest and in anticipation of winter months dictated by dark and cold. Much of what we associate with Christmastide is simply a continuation of human practices of reveling in light, warmth, decoration, feasting and community that have been deeply engrained over millennia.

Today that takes the form of lights, greenery, baking, and Christmas cards to friends both old and new. Of course, it also means endless holiday sales and shopping opportunities to buy all kinds of gifts to exchange. On the one hand, it can all be quite festive and fun. On the other hand, the relentless inundation of music, lights, decorations, parties, concerts, shopping, wrapping and mailing can be overwhelming. Which brings us back to Advent. Far from a "countdown to Christmas," the season of Advent is a gift the church offers to people of faith. Advent keeps us.

Advent keeps us from falling headlong into holiday overload by holding a space that says, "we're looking forward to the coming of something that can't be bought, wrapped and put under the tree." Advent keeps us looking beyond the razzle dazzle of all our artificial lights toward the coming of the true light that is the life of all people. Advent keeps us from believing the empty promise that all of this "cheer" can save us from the dark of our longest nights. Even as we are surrounded and delighted by the swirl of holiday celebrations that predate anything Christian, the church holds onto Advent so that we might be kept in a state of readiness for something so much better that has yet to come. Advent keeps us from feeling like we must compete with all the rest so that when the time finally comes, we can tell a much different story. One that takes place in the unadorned dark of a silent and holy night.



USING TRADITIONAL IRA TO GIVE TO CHURCH INCOME TAX-FREE

For senior donors to our church (over 70 1/2 years old) with a traditional Individual Retirement Account (IRA) (not Roth IRA, 401k or 403b plans), a direct cash contribution from your IRA to First Presbyterian Church is <u>income tax-free</u>.

Not only is it a nontaxable distribution, it counts towards any Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) that may affect the donor for that year. It also means the donor's Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) for federal income tax purposes is lower than with a taxable IRA distribution. This fact can provide some taxpayers with other tax benefits.

This type of tax-free distribution is limited to an annual amount of \$100,000 per donor to all charities and there are other limitations on the amount of non-taxable distributions related to tax-deductible CONTRIBUTIONS made to an IRA after 70 1/2.

All you have to do is contact your IRA custodian or trustee and ask them how to make a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) to First Presbyterian Church. Not only are you giving to God's work here, but the government provides you an extra bonus tax-wise.

Of course, you cannot double-dip by also claiming a charitable contribution deduction for any income taxfree distribution on Schedule A because it was never recognized as income but that can be better than an itemized deduction.

This is general information available to the public. You must check with your own personal tax advisor to determine if you qualify and how this QCD applies to your particular tax situation.

As we have done for the past two years, we are again offering you a way to live into Advent by giving to some of our mission partners. You have, each year, been so generous and helpful. Our mission partners were so grateful for the gifts you provided.

We have chosen the same partners as last year because these are the agencies you seem happy to serve, and they need large amounts of consumables. The needs are much as they were last year, daily necessities that most of us take for granted. The rationale is much the same as last year – the high cost of "affordable housing" and the increasing cost of food and household supplies.

Tags are on the tree or on a placard near the tree. Take a tag for the agency you wish to support and replace it with a small angel from the box nearby. Please attach your tag to the bag or box of supplies you provide so we know who is the planned recipient since 3 agencies are asking for very similar items. The agencies are:

Albuquerque Healthcare for the Homeless

Barrett House

Crossroads for Women

Downtown Community School Collaborative

Rio Grande Food Project

One change this year is the inclusion of two schools in the Downtown Community School Collaborative in support of their Maker Spaces. These schools have Extended Days when classes or clubs that serve the interests of the students are offered: chess, art, music, etc. This is the site of their STEM Maker Spaces, and they need supplies and equipment to provide more experiences for these future scientists and innovators. We told them to ask for what they need...some items are expensive. Fortunately, some of our TGIF groups are planning to contribute toward some large ticket items. The schools will be grateful for any support they get.
