
Many thanks to all who contributed to the Green Tea to benefit Menaul School Tuition Assistance. PW raised \$1200 to send to Menaul for this purpose.

Our next book will be "The Covenant of Water" by Abraham Verghese. We will be meeting on April 25, 2024 at 10am in the Conference room, meeting leader is Kim Denton-Hill.

About the book (from the back cover):

Spanning the years 1900 to 1977, The Covenant of Water is set in Kerala, on South India's Malabar Coast, and follows three generations of a family that suffers a peculiar affliction: in every generation, at least one person dies by drowning—and in Kerala, water is everywhere. At the turn of the century, a twelve-year-old girl from Kerala's long-existing Christian community, grieving the death of her father, is sent by boat to her wedding, where she will meet her forty-year-old husband for the first time. From this unforgettable new beginning, the young girl—and future matriarch, known as Big Ammachi—will witness unthinkable changes over the span of her extraordinary life, full of joy and triumph as well as hardship and loss, her faith and love the only constants.



Earth Day Resources for Santa Fe Presbytery Congregations

The first Earth Day was held on April 2, 1970. Since then, over one billion people participate each year in this effort to protect our planet. It is the largest civic movement on earth, bringing people from 192 countries together. It is not a "day" but a movement working toward a healthier, more sustainable environment. This year the organizers of Earth Day are directing us to increasingly reduce the use of plastics for the sake of human, non-human, and planetary health.

Santa Fe Presbytery's Earth Care Team has several suggestions for how to celebrate Earth Day on Sunday, April 21, but use your imagination and be creative.

PRAY

- *Prayers of Confession can focus on the many ways we abuse creation and fail to be the stewards that God has called us to be. Prayers of the People can lift up those who suffer the most from climate change, and petition God to move hearts and minds toward a more peaceful, environmentally sustainable planet.
- *Use the Earth Day Litany (below)
- *Have teens write their prayer concerns for the planet they are inheriting.
- *Involve younger children. Perhaps the children could draw pictures on the Earth Day theme and be displayed for the congregation to see.

LEARN

- *Plan Adult Education events to learn more about the climate crisis and how we as Christians can respond.
- *Youth are gravely concerned about the future they will inherit. Listen to them and help them find hope and courage to face their uncertain future. Ask the youth questions, such as: How important is the health of our planet to your future? What's one change we could make that would improve the planet's health?
- *Perhaps you can invite a guest speaker on Earth Day to lead the congregation in a reflection. Alternately, if you have a teenage or adult Sunday School class this could be done in that class.
